PER CURIAM:

American Infoage, LLC, brought this lawsuit against Regions Bank after Regions imposed a “swap breakage fee” under the parties’ written swap agreements. Infoage asserted claims for fraud, negligent misrepresentation, breach of contract, breach of the implied covenant of good faith and fair dealings, and unjust enrichment. The district court granted partial summary judgment to Regions with respect to some of the claims and, after a bench trial, entered judgment in favor of Regions on the rest of the claims. This is Infoage’s appeal.<sup>1</sup>

After reviewing the record and reading the parties’ briefs, we affirm the district court’s grant of partial summary judgment in favor of Regions, which was filed on September 25, 2014, as well as its judgment in favor of Regions based on its thorough and well-reasoned findings of fact and conclusions of law filed on July 9, 2015.
